Report From the Director

This year we said goodbye to Dr. Suzanne Miller, our longstanding Director of our Head Start program. Dr. Miller dedicated nearly 15 years to CSC and has done so much to ensure the Head Start program operates at the highest quality. She cared deeply for every staff person and every child who walked through our doors. She supported the program with successfully navigating through the COVID-19 pandemic and ensured everyone was safe and healthy at all times, a nearly impossible task at times. We are so grateful for all that Dr. Miller contributed and we

wish her the best as she transitions into retirement.

Andrea Lengel, the program's former Program Education Manager, has stepped into the director role at CSC Head Start to fill Dr. Miller's shoes. This, of course, meant that we were in need of a new Program Education Manager, as well as a Health and Nutrition Supervisor since Andrea was filling in for both roles concurrently. We were very fortunate to have hired Nicole Reid for the Program Education Manager position. Nicole comes with several years of experience in various school settings and is a former Head Start parent at the local tribal program.

Nicole has been doing a wonderful job in getting to know the children and staff at our program, and we look forward to what she has to offer for next school year.

We are in search for a candidate for the Health and Nutrition Supervisor positions and hope to hire for this position as soon as possible. In addition, we will have a new Family Services Supervisor next school year as Marta Vrell has decided to take on another position within Head Start. While we are experiencing a lot of changes, we know that we can work together to create a wonderful program that supports all children and families who come through our

Mental Health and Disability Services

Brittany Prindel, Mental Health and Disabilities Content Specialist (MHDCS)

Mental health & socialemotional well-being is still a crucial need in our community. CSCHS provided additional support to 60 children & family members who needed referrals to mental health services or support in the classroom. MHDCS works closely with the CSC team to implement an integrated Positive Behavior Support Plan Model. This provides support for effective classroom management by creating a positive learning environment to help children with challenging behaviors & other social-emotional or mental health concerns. MHDCS & Director also developed a new

partnership with an organization specializing in ABA Therapy. Team PBS (Positive Behavior Support) Corp & CSCHS now have an active program agreement. This allows trained professionals to work 1:1 with children in the classroom and build essential social skills. This year, 4 children were referred to Team PBS and received support in the classroom and 3 were referred to our Mental Health Consultant. 5/6 PBS plans closed successfully, MHDCS collaborated with our contracted Mental Health Consultant (MHC), PEM, Teacher, and family to

determine the most appropriate approach to individualize services in a culturally responsible

We continue to work closely with LBL (Linn, Benton, & Lincoln) Early Childhood Special Education (ECSE) to serve children with disabilities. ECSE staff joined our health fair at the beginning of the school year, which allowed us to identify children with additional needs quickly so they can receive additional supports in the classroom. 55 children were referred to ECSE and 30 of the 55 referred and screened qualified for ECSE services.

Health

Health and well-being for our staff, children, and families continued to be a priority this program year. We make well-being resources from the community available to families throughout the program year. Health and safety resources are sent to all families to review during winter break, spring break, and summer; resources are tailored to family needs and based on the most up-todate resources for our coastal community. We continue to utilize the staff "Wellness Board" at each site dedicated to wellness activities and resources for staff. The wellness board is updated throughout the year with fun new activities and opportunities to build community within our agency. Director sends the many mental health and wellness resources available through the Office of Head Start to staff as they became available. May was mental health awareness month, so we incorporated time during our May All Staff to provide self-care materials and activities. We continue to look for new resources as they become available.

Teacher/Advocates successfully supported our children's health this year by helping families keep up to date on their child's annual well child and dental check ups, as demonstrated in the table on the following page. Our partnerships with local clinics help us to collect health information about our children so we are better able to understand the child's individual health needs or to support families with getting additional treatment for their child.

This year we were very successful with completing our 45-day vision and hearing screenings, as well as follow up for children who needed medical follow up. Several staff at each site went through training to be able to support with screening children. We were able to identify 15 children who need glasses and 2 children who need auditory support, such as hearing aides. We also purchased two additional vision screeners this year to replace old equipment that was beginning to show signs of low quality screenings.

Director attends the Lincoln County
Public Health Advisory Committee to

happening in our community. We have
been able to work with the public health
department to share ideas for improving
services in the county, including
updating and sharing immunization
information and sharing surveys with our
families to better support those whose
primary language is Spanish. We look
forward to providing new resources from
public health next school year.



ead Start develops and maintains many community partnerships to promote the health of the families we serve, effectively using resources such as Women, Infants and Children (WIC), Oregon Health Plan (OHP) and health and dental provider relationships. WIC's collaboration with Head Start allows us to better assist families served by both programs. We have a close partnership with OSU Extension to provide nutrition resources and education to the children and families. OSU has staff who join teachers in the classroom to teach children about healthy foods and physical activity, and the children get to make their own healthy snack. We partner with Capitol Dental in Salem who has a dental hygienist who provides screenings and fluoride varnish treatment to children three times during the school year. Casey Eye partners with us to perform vision screenings at health fair and support parents with follow-up if a vision concern is identified. We are pleased to have a great network of vital community partners.

Parent & Community Engagement

Marta Vrell, Family Services Supervisor

Success at CSC Head Start hinges on strong relationships between families, our staff members, and the community. Our program supports and strengthens parent-child relationships and strives to engage families in their child's learning and development. Parents share insights, concerns, and knowledge of their child with teachers and family advocates, helping Head Start to create a positive and effective individualized learning experience for each child.

Head Start Teachers and Family Advocates assist families in determining their needs and supports them in achieving their own goals, such as continued education, steady employment, financial security or housing stability. Our families and staff worked closely, and they wrote 314 family goals and identified 659 family needs. This year, 57% of the goals were written around family well-being. This large percentage is indicative of our families need for support in securing safe and permanent housing, overcoming food insecurities, and staying safe and happy.

The second largest goal request from families was the desire to learn more parenting strategies and tools. CSC Head Start's evidenced based parenting curriculum, Ready Rosie, is directly aligned with the curriculum that teachers use in the classroom. These educational

videos show learning activities that provide a perfect crosswalk for strategies being taught in the class to what parents can now use in their homes. These videos are available in English and Spanish which is ideal as about a third of our families are Spanish speaking.

Opportunities for parent engagement and leadership in the program include being a member of our Policy Council where they can be involved in making Head Start program decisions or by attending our Family Nights where they can get to know each other and learn more about resources. Our teachers and Family Advocates meet with the families at least 4 times per year to discuss their child's progress and any concerns the parents may have. Of our 160 enrolled children this year, over 30% of fathers or father figures participated in these Head Start activities.

Throughout the school year, families receive services and referrals to community resources for housing/utility assistance, mental health, ESL or GED classes, health/medical care and parenting education. CSC Head Start is proud to have strong community partnerships, which is a vital component of our program's success. We are grateful for the

generous contributions of our talented and responsive community partners, including various mental health agencies, Early Childhood Special Education, Parents as Teachers, Maternal Child Health Services, Oregon Family Support Network, Parent Child Interaction Therapy, OCCC, Capitol Dental, Homeless Education and Literacy Project, Newport Food Pantry, Business for Excellence in Youth, Lincoln County Food Share, OSU Extension, Oregon Coastal Quilters Guild, Chapel by the Sea and all the CSC programs. Additionally, we appreciate being part of a network of service organizations who generously notify CSC Head Start of events that may be of benefit to our families.

Our Head Start program empowers families as their child's first and foremost teachers and focuses on encouraging families to be engaged in their children's education. We know that children will grow and succeed as their families grow and succeed.

School Readiness & Transitioning to Kindergarten Nicole Reid, Program Education Manager

he Head Start approach to school readiness: children are ready for school, families are ready to support their children's learning, and schools are ready for children. CSC Head Start (CSCHS) faithfully applies this approach in its work with children, families, and local schools to promote school readiness for each child.

Children are prepared for school by dedicated teachers, developmentally appropriate teaching strategies, research-based curricula and an assessment tool aligned with the Head Families understand and appreciate the Start Early Leaning Outcomes Framework. We partner with families to prepare them for their child's entry into kindergarten. School readiness goals are reviewed with parents, activities for home learning are shared, and their child's progress is discussed throughout the year. Local schools are ready for incoming kindergarten children as kindergarten teachers attend Head Start Family

Nights, meet with CSCHS teachers, and welcome CSCHS children and families to their new school during the school district's "Taste of Kindergarten" event, where children can explore the new school environment and parents can register their child for kindergarten. Kindergarten transition activities sponsored by CSCHS and Lincoln County School District (LCSD) connect children and families with their future school, begin positive relationships with future teachers, and promote a successful, happy start of school.

CSC Head Start school readiness goals were selected from our assessment tool's learning objectives in alignment with Lincoln County school readiness skills and the Head Start Early Learning Outcomes Framework. 21 learning objectives with specific levels of development were adopted as our school readiness goals. The majority of levels of development selected for school readiness goals are on the high end of preschool learning expectations.

The table below shows the progress made over the program year by our children who are transitioning to kindergarten. Three times a year we review school readiness outcomes data in order to implement instructional strategies in the classroom and family engagement strategies to increase children's learning.

Aggregated program-wide data for the 2023-24 school year:

In addition to tracking school readiness goal development for children transitioning to kindergarten, the developmental progress of all children is monitored and aggregated for 60 learning objectives. Our assessment tool provides widely held expectations for each age-group, three year olds and pre-kindergarteners, in six areas of learning. If a child's knowledge, skills, and behaviors are assessed at a level within the range for the child's age, the child demonstrates widely held expectations for the area of learning. Widely held expectations are not shown for the areas of science and technology, social studies, the arts, and English language acquisition, as research does not currently support definitions of expectations.

SC Head Start provides early learning instruction in 10 areas of development and learning aligned with the Head Start Early Learning Outcomes Framework.

<u>Cognitive</u>: child initiative, curiosity, engagement, persistence, problem solving, and symbolic representation.

The Arts: music concepts, visual arts, dramatic play, creative movement and dance.

<u>Mathematics</u>: numbers and operations, geometry, patterns and beginning measurement concepts.

English Language Acquisition: receptive and expressive English language skills.

<u>Literacy</u>: book appreciation and knowledge, phonological awareness, alphabet knowledge, early writing and print concepts.

<u>Science & Technology:</u> prediction, observation, description, explanation, classification, and questioning skills.

Physical: physical health status, health knowledge and practices, gross and fine motor skills.

<u>Social—Emotional</u>: social relationships, self concept, self regulation, emotional and behavioral health.

<u>Social Studies</u>: concepts pertaining to self, family, community, environment, history, and events.

<u>Language:</u> receptive and expressive language abilities

End of Year Celebrations

To get ready for the end of the year teachers shared kindergarten transition activities that are put on yearly by the school district. These events included a Taste of Kindergarten and the Summer Jump Start program to all parents with a transitioning child.

Celebrations of learning and friendship over the 2023-2024 program year included children performing in classrooms in front of families, peers and staff. Teachers recognized each child's accomplishments in various moving up and graduation ceremonies for each site.

Teachers took pictures of children in a cap and gown to give to families. Teachers sent home take home bags with materials focused on social and emotional wellness so the children can continue learning and growing over summer with their families.

This coming September, 80 CSC Head Start children will be entering kindergarten. A bright future of continued learning awaits them. We wish each child and family well and thank them for being a part of our Head Start family.
